

# Previous bird survey was performed in 2007

- Targeted 4 species (over 3 months) and found:
- No Tui
- Very few kereru (n=3)
- Saddleback (n=13)
- Total 58 individuals
- (0.5 birds per 5-minutes)





Fig. X. Mean no of birds per five minute bird count for each indicator species recorded at bird monitoring station on Motuihe, Nov 2007 - Jan 2008.

#### Restoration progress on Motuihe








## Results from 2024 survey

- Both diversity and abundances of species has increased overall
- 23 species, 70% were native
- 7 threatened species recorded on Motuihe\*
  - kakariki, dotterel, bellbird, spotless crake, whitehead, kaka, saddleback
- Spotless Crake have self introduced to the island



\*2024 Tāmaki Makaurau conservation status


#### How does this survey compare to the 2007 bird survey?

243% increase in average count 2007 Average 0.5 birds 2024: Average 5 birds

Wide distribution across the island:

- $T\bar{u}\bar{i} = 85\%$  of stations
- Saddleback = 75% of stations
- Grey Warbler = 87.5% of stations

Decrease in Kereru from previous survey -seasonal variation in distribution?



#### What would we like to do in 2025?


 Repeat the 5 minute bird count survey (to compare to previous surveys and be able to observe trends in populations over time)
September

- Quarterly surveys to better understand the distribution and seasonal variability of bird species at Motuihe
  - April
  - July
  - September
  - January
- Targeted species surveys using acoustic play-backs (spotless crake, bellbird)

#### Kereru

 Its important we know their distribution and presence on Motuihe

 Some of our trees depend almost entirely on kereru for seed dispersal (i.e., Karaka)



- NZ parrots can be threatened by exotic species such as Rosella
  - Spread disease
  - Displacement
  - Competition

Its important monitor regularly to inform the Trust whether anything negative is happening with these species



#### What volunteers can expect?



- Paired with a team leader who is familiar with calls/sight
- An in-person training session
- You'll have GPS, maps, directions
- Opportunities to be involved with other activities:
  - planting trees
  - weeding
  - targeted species surveying
